WHY THIS STUDY?

Ongoing changes in the development cooperation sector and in academia

→ two-year research trajectory: 2021-2023

Key questions

- How does the University Development Cooperation (UDC) framework work at UGent?
- What barriers and bottlenecks exist and how do we engage with them?
- What benefits could arise from different approaches to fostering more equitable, reciprocal, and just collaborations





METHODOLOGY

Interviews

International partners based in Global South	28
UGent admin and policy staff	25
UGent-based academics	46
PhD students	23
Students	8
External stakeholders	12
Total	142

Two surveys (collaboration IQ-GEAR)

PhD participants from the Global South, enrolled at Ghent University	N 480	33%
PhD Supervisor participants	N 416	30%

THREE MAIN CONTRADICTIONS OF THE FRAMEWORK FOR UNIVERSITY DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION (UDC)

- 1. Collaborative dynamics: reciprocity, inequality and difference
- 2. Producing and sharing knowledge: society, the local and the global
- 3. Why change? Internal weak spots, and benefits from change

❖ Focus: how do concrete challenges of international N-S cooperation in policy and practice relate to broader contradictions with the UDCframework?

COLLABORATIVE DYNAMICS: THE UDC-FRAMEWORK

Towards 'mutually beneficial' and reciprocal partnerships → how to recognize and address inequalities and power imbalances in North-South cooperation?

CONTRADICTION

- UDC inherently misses a response to address asymmetries beyond donorrecipient relationship
- Types of interventions required are disputed

RECIPROCITY

- 1. Ownership
- 2. Contributions
- 3. Benefits
- 4. Learning

PRODUCING AND SHARING KNOWLEDGE: THE UDC-FRAMEWORK

Towards 'global challenges' and 'global development' → how to (re)position the 'South' and the 'North' in the constellation of 'the global' and 'the local'?

CONTRADICTION

Absence of a 'localized' perspective on the Global North, and on Ghent University

A LOCAL PERSPECTIVE

- 1. UGent capacities (admin, academic, financial)
- 2. Institutional compartmentalization
- 3. Contributions of South-partners to UGent





WHY CHANGE? INTERNAL WEAK SPOTS, AND BENEFITS FROM CHANGE





WHY CHANGE THE UDC-FRAMEWORK?

Towards 'moving beyond UDC' → Why change and to whose benefit?

CONTRADICTION

Reflections on 'why change' are often shaped by similar rationales that underpin UDC

→ 'Benefits' for the North are rarely part of the conversation

BENEFITS FOR UGENT

- 1. N-S cooperation reveals internal weak spots at UGent
- 2. Tackling weak spots can strengthen UGent locally and internationally
- 3. N-S interaction





GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

Contradictions related to the UDC-framework are relevant for challenges faced by the development cooperation sector at large

value for different areas and policy domains at and beyond UGent

1 A policy framework with attention for the intersection of specific reciprocity dimensions with N-S power imbalances and inequalities

- A 'localized' perspective on the Global North. This also requires UDC to move beyond its 'special track' to interact with broader approaches to internationalization
- 3 A vision to 'move beyond UDC' with attention for internal weak spots revealed through N-S cooperation
